My Dear Loved Ones:

God says in the title of Psalm 90 - "A prayer of Moses the man of God."

You may be thinking, "We finished this Psalm two day ago with the last verse!" Well, we did finish the last verse, that is true, but we have not covered the whole Psalm. Remember when we first went through Psalm 46? At the beginning of Psalm 46 is a "title" that was written with the verses of the psalm; it is the same here in Psalm 90. Not every Psalm in the book of Psalms has a title with it, but Psalm 90 does. We treat these words just like Scripture themselves. The title to the psalm says "A prayer of Moses the man of God."

That means that this psalm is one of the oldest of all the psalms written: worthy of note.

Also, notice what it says about Moses; it calls him "the man of God" (De 33:1). This phrase is used over seventy times in the Old Testament referring to a person who spoke for God. It is also used of Samuel (1 Sa 9:6, 10); David (Ne 12:24); Elijah (1 Ki 17:18); Elisha (2 Ki 4:7); Shemaiah (2 Ch 11:2); Igdaliah (Je 35:4); and Timothy (1 Ti 6:11).

From this, there are some things we need to learn. Man was made to function well only when in fellowship with his Creator. This kind of fellowship is more than being on speaking terms. There's an old hymn "Nothing Between My Soul and the Savior," which is speaking about the fact that there should not be anything bad (unconfessed sin) between our souls and the Savior. So, yes, fellowship with God is possible when there is thong between my soul and the Savior; but there must also be much going on between my soul and the Savior!

A married couple may live in the same house and get alone without much friction. But God planned marriage to be so much more than mutual interests, goals and respect. God intends for that could to develop such a like-mindedness with each other that there is an obvious mutual devotion, admiration, and dependence upon each other. Yes, they have mutual interests, but they also have mutual devotion, and they find their greatest joy to be the joy of the other. Marriage was created by God to mirror the kind of relationship He wishes to have with us: the Creator and His creature finds the greatest joy in the joy of the other.

Certain Bible characters have a quality relationship with God. Enoch walked with God (Ge 5:24). Abraham was called "the friend of God (Ja 2:23). Moses spoke with God face to face as a man speaks to his friend (Ex 33:11). God called David a man after His Own heart (1 Sa 13:14). Their relationships weren't unique that no one else can have. Any one of us can have that kind of relationship with God. Do you believe that? Are you trying to practice it?
